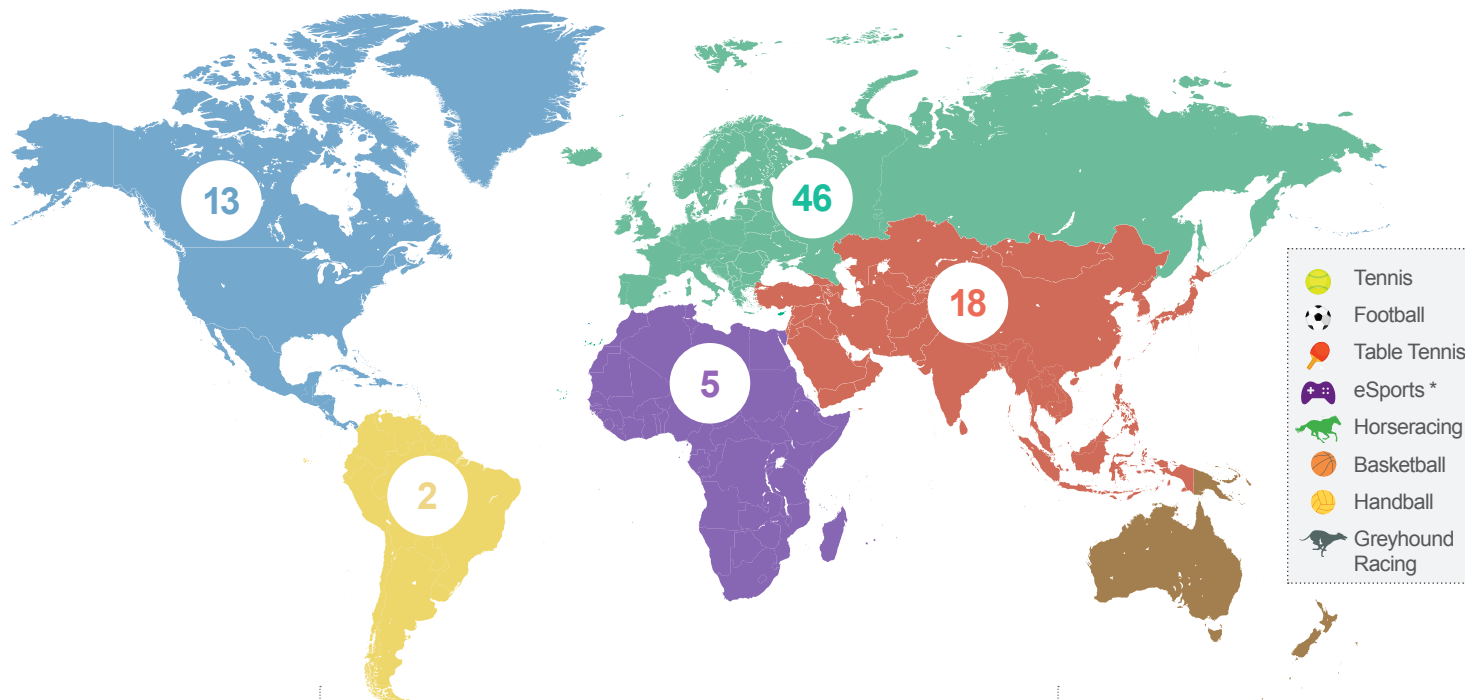

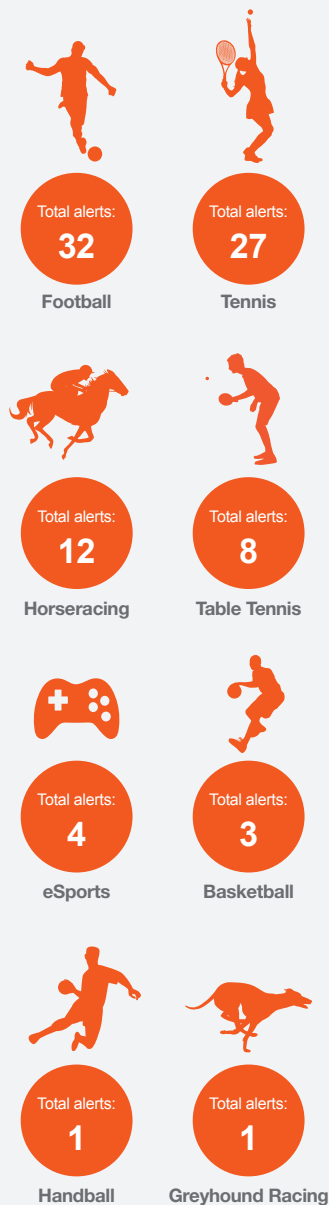

## Q2 2022 alerts by sport



Countries have been grouped following the official UN classification, except for Cyprus which has been listed under Europe.  
 \* 4 eSports alert reported. eSports alerts haven't been allocated a country as it's not always clear where an event has been hosted.

## Trends

- 1 A total of 88 suspicious alerts on eight different sports across 36 different countries were reported to the relevant authorities for further investigation in Q2 2022.
  - This figure may be revised in future depending on the outcome of any ongoing investigations.
- 2 Football (32 alerts) and tennis (27 alerts) continue to dominate the number of alerts being reported in Q2, along with horse racing (12 alerts).
  - Those three sports accounted for 81% of all Q2 alerts.
- 3 Europe's 46 alerts accounted for 52% of the total reported in Q2, followed by Asia with 18 alerts which made up 20%.
- 4 Of the 27 tennis alerts, twelve matches were provided to the International Tennis Integrity Agency (ITIA) as intelligence reports as they do not relate to events sanctioned by the main tennis tours.
  - However, some players engaged in those events may fall within the scope of the body's Tennis Anti-Corruption Program (TACP).

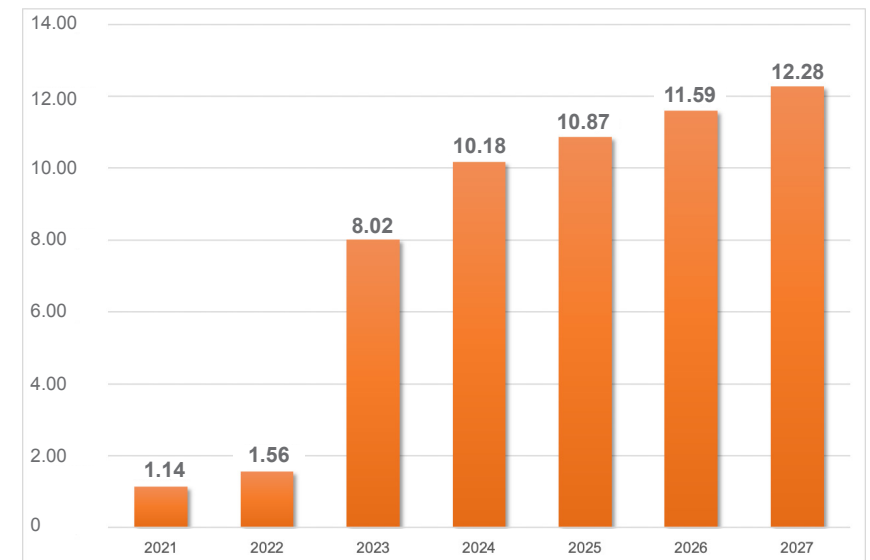

## Betting Data: Ontario

Ontario was the principal focus of interest during Q2, with the Canadian province opening its online gambling market to regulated operators on 4<sup>th</sup> April.

According to leading global intelligence and data company H2 Gambling Capital, the gross betting turnover (handle) in Ontario – including horse racing – is expected to increase considerably in the coming years, mainly driven by the increased availability of sports betting. Gross betting turnover (handle) was calculated at C\$1.14bn in 2021 and is expected to see a dramatic increase to C\$8.02bn in 2023, up around 600%, and then reaching C\$12.28bn by 2027.

All operators applying for a betting licence in Ontario need to be part of an integrity monitoring body; IBIA has been accredited as an independent integrity monitor by the Alcohol & Gaming Commission of Ontario (AGCO) and represents the majority of the operators currently offering sports betting in the province.
